One of the highlights is Takeda-jo Castle Ruins, the Castle in the Sky. Other highlights include Koseki no Michi connecting Ikuno, the cornerstone of Japan's mining development, to the Former Mikobata Mine and Akenobe Mine. From Asago to Yabu, the panoramic structure of the former Mikobata Mine nestle in the Chugoku mountains is truly a breathtaking sight. Former Mikobata Mine Following the rediscovery of silver veins in 1878, the Mikobata Mine operated as a branch of the Ikuno Silver Mine. The mine eventually closed in 1917. Afterwards, the mine became a processing center for ore mined at Akenobe Mine, becoming East Asia's largest processing center at its peak. Resembling a tiger reposing, this former castle is often dubbed "Torafusu-jo" and "Koga-jo" (the Lying Tiger Castle). The ruins have been selected as one of Japan's top 100 castles. Also known as the "Castle in the Sky" and "Japan's Machu Picchu," Takeda-jo Castle Ruins is a popular destination for tourists from throughout Japan.

Akenobe Mine B3 Exploration Tunnel


